The answer Jesus gave has a reassurance for us all. Jesus said that anyone willing to sacrifice for him would "receive a hundred times as much in this present age. and in the age to come eternal life". A far better outcome than any stock market could ever match!

With God, what we get back isn't measured on pounds and pence, but in the joy that comes from knowing him now and for eternity. We have to avoid the 27th May bank holiday and 21st May agm.



FIGHTING DOMESTIC ABUSE IN MOZAMBIQUE

You're helping bring access to justice in one of the poorest nations in the world by supporting BMS World Mission.

You can't report a crime if you don't know you're a victim. And that's often the case for people in Mozambique, where it's not unusual for people not to understand the law. But BMS workers and partners are changing that.

BMS lawyer Mark Barrell is working with the Association of Christian Lawyers in Mozambique (AMAC). "The aim of AMAC is to provide access to justice to the most poorest and vulnerable people," says Mark. "Often the people we help will be women, whose status in Mozambican society can be very low." Women like Isabel*.

Isabel was abused by her husband, but she didn't understand what domestic abuse was, or that it is illegal. Fortunately, BMS partners were there to help. Isabel attended an AMAC session on domestic violence and was taught what is defined as abuse, and why it's wrong. Isabel spoke

to a lawyer on the team, who quickly realised that she was an abuse survivor. She was taken to the police station that same day to report the crime.

Just a few months later, Isabel's husband was brought before a judge. The court placed a restriction on him, and he was told that he could face imprisonment for any further abuse.

If AMAC hadn't been there, there's no telling how long Isabel would have continued to suffer. But now she can live without fear, and with the encouragement of knowing that AMAC will keep helping other people like her. She knows they are determined to keep bringing access to justice to those who need it.

HELPING PEOPLE SEE THEIR LIVES ARE WORTH LIVING

In places like Nepal, where people have suffered unimaginable trauma, suicide might seem like the only way out for some who are experiencing terrible mental distress. But your support for BMS World Mission is helping to change that.

BMS counsellor Jenny Saunders is working with a local partner specialising in counselling in Kathmandu, training Nepalis to become counsellors in communities across their country. Critical to the work is raising awareness of the symptoms of trauma. Jenny trains people to find individuals who are trusted in their local communities, so they can identify the symptoms and help people get support.

“Counsellors in Nepal have very little access to supervision,” says Jenny. “So we want to promote a more holistic approach to supervision, in which we can supervise each other.” That approach sees Jenny train her counsellors to work in peer groups to give each other the emotional support they need, and the structure to work ethically and professionally. One of the first people Jenny trained was Binsa. Binsa then trained counsellors in rural communities. Binsa saw peer learning as a great opportunity for the people she worked with. As they worked in rural communities, they would never be able

to access the supervision they needed. But by approaching their training the way Jenny suggested, Binsa ensured they would be able to rely on each other to meet their support needs, and the needs of the people they were counselling.

Jenny is undertaking further research into supervision techniques in Nepal. And she's hoping to make as big an impact as she can. “We want to make changes at a policy level. We'd love it to be mandatory for counsellors to have supervision,” she says. It might not seem like that big of a deal on first reading, but Jenny's work is putting the key steps in place to ensure that people won't see suicide as the only way out.

“Without supervision, it's very easy to burn out or not do a good job,” says Jenny. “You need someone to support you.” By supporting BMS, you're supporting Jenny's work. That means you're helping her and helping others save lives.

- All those involved in missionary work at home and abroad, naming those specifically whom we are aware of, that God will build His Church both here and in all the world.

My name is George Ronald Bolton (better known as Ron) and I was born on 23rd October 1932 in Accrington. I lived in Accrington until I was married and went to live in Burnley. We were married at the Immanuel Chapel in Burnley on 2nd April 1960 and we have two girls, Christine and Beverley, 5 grandchildren and one great grandson, Theo. Our family became regular attenders at Brierfield Baptist shortly after we moved to live in Hallwood Close, Reedley.

I have been involved with young people in the youth group at our chapel and before I was married I was in the Boy Scouts as a Scout and as a Scout leader. I have enjoyed many sports throughout my life in football, table tennis, golf and other outdoor activities in walking and gardening. After I retired, I started presenting a series of talks to a variety of Men's and women's groups and organisations on such subjects as "Superstitions", "Clogs", "Family History" and "Christmas traditions" among others. My favourite meal is roast duckling and pasta dishes and really I just enjoy most foods as long as they are well cooked and well presented.
